Garden Description. The garden has been developed, bit by bit over the past 8 years, from rough scrubby grass with lots of Laurel planted by

the previous owners. The soil is shallow well drained chalk with a high pH and plants have been chosen for these conditions. It is also very exposed. We have a wildlife pond, mixed perennial and shrub borders, shade bed, greenhouse and small raised bed area for fruit and veg. Annuals are used to fill gaps in the newer areas, which also allows colour schemes to be changed throughout the year. I garden for wildlife, so it has a relaxed feel and beneficial wildflowers are incorporated or tolerated. This year I've been growing various umbels (Apiaceae family), including perennial *Seseli libanotis* (a rare native in the UK found on chalkland) and trying prairie plants such as Ratibida and Heliopsis. Current favourites in the garden are *Nepeta nuda* 'Romany Dusk', tall with upright dark stems, and *Salvia* 'African Skies', hardy in the garden but amazing too in pots.
